- ... gladly seek answers to my communications & leadership questions from my mentor (& others as needed) for at least 90-days.
- ... make an earnest effort to complete one level (3 projects); however, realizing that it is the journey & mentor-mentee relationship that matters most, not just the goal/award.
- ... remember that trust is the cornerstone of the successful mentor-mentee relationship.

## Distinguished Club Status Update by Laura Dougan and Doug Kelly

Toastmasters International (TI) rates its clubs on how well we encourage members to pursue their personal public speaking and leadership goals.

A President's Distinguished Club is the highest rating given to a club. A Distinguished Club is the lowest. In addition, it is critically important that membership increases by 5 members or is at least 20 members to earn any rating.




Figure 3: Our club achieved 5 goals (#5, #7, #8, #9, and #10). Also, our membership increased by 3 (16 to 19)!

Achieving a distinguished status rating is a goal our club sets each year. Due to difficulties surrounding the pandemic as many of our members' attendance waned, we fell short of achieving this goal for the 2020-2021 Toastmaster year. Our club achieved 5 out of 10 goals and had 19 total members shown in Figure 3.

Overall, we achieved 5 goals by earning 3 educational awards, adding 9 new members, increasing membership size by 3, training 4 club officers, and renewing dues on-time. Over the past decade, our club has achieved an average of 7 goals per year by earning 5 educational awards, adding 12 new members, decreasing membership size by 2, training 4 club officers, and only missing dues renewal in 2009. Hence, our best feat this year was increasing our membership size in 2021 (+3) which was only bested in 2014 (+4) and 2009 (+8) as illustrated in Figure 4.



**Figure 4**: The change in membership size did not increase in 9 of 13 years but 2021 saw the largest increase in 7 years!

Clearly, the trend has been fewer and fewer club members over time but this year membership size actually increased by 3! Next, let's examine APL's club history.

# Our Distinguished Club History by Doug Kelly





Figure 5: APL Club Year-End Status over 13-years (2009-Present).

Over the last 13 years, our club has been a Distinguished Club for 11 years as revealed in Figure 5.

Our club was **Select Distinguished** in 2008-2009. Since 2010, we were **President's Distinguished** 3 years in a row followed by 5 consecutive years of **Select Distinguished**. From 2017-2019, we were **Distinguished**. Recently, despite achieving 5-6 goals, we were **Not Distinguished**. However, if one of our new members had joined our club one day earlier, we would have been **Distinguished** again this year, too. Hence, you belong to a rather high-performing club! This year, if we pull together, we can restore our **Perfect 10** status from over a decade ago in 2010. But it will take a focused, team effort to do so.

## Our Educational Achievement History by Doug Kelly

Education is an important part of every Toastmaster's journey and is a critical aspect of all club meetings. Actively participating in educational programs allows members to gain the valuable practice needed to develop their public speaking, communication, and leadership skills. Since the founding of Toastmasters in 1924, programs have been driven by the experiential learning, peer feedback, mentoring, and self-pace principles.

Today, in the Pathways educational program, members are recognized for every achievement and milestone. One way to measure how well a club develops their members is by counting the number of educational awards issued each year. For the past decade, our club has ensured that, on average, 4 members earned 5 educational awards each and every year. This and the prior decade of educational achievement are depicted in Figure 6.



**Figure 6**: Over 2 decades, as low as 0 and as high as 9 awards were earned by club members. Hence, 4-5 awards per year.

For the first decade (2000-2010), the number of awards mostly increased from a low of 0 to a high of 9. Overall, about 4 awards per year. For the second decade (2011-2021), the number of awards gradually decreased from a high of 8 to a low of 3. Overall, about 5 awards per year.

After analyzing our member's educational goals in July 2021, the VPE and rest of the Executive Committee feel that 10 or more awards this year is achievable!

# Our Leadership Training History by Doug Kelly

Another key aspect of being a successful club is ensuring elected club officers understand their duties and have the right skills. Each district in Toastmasters, therefore, hosts summer and winter sessions through Training Leadership Institute (TLI) events to develop leadership and networking skills.

Toastmasters International (TI) encourages at least 4 officers attend 2 TLI's each year. So how have we done historically? Figure 7 reveals this.



**Figure 7**: Over the past decade, the number of trained club officers has been declining with 5 recent years of fewer than 4.

Clearly, the past decade shows a decreasing trend of officers attending TLI events. In fact, for five years, fewer than 4 officers were trained. This can adversely impact member experience inside and outside of club meetings.

This year, APL club officers are striving to become a Dream Team where all 7 club offices attend TLI twice. Essentially, the more trained officers translates into a more seamless, higher quality and consistent club meeting experience for all guests and members.

# Our Membership Growth History by Elise Roberts, Doug Kelly and Latonya Robinson

In order to most effectively conduct the educational program, a club should have at least 20 members.

Some membership turnover is healthy and unavoidable as members relocate, change jobs or encounter other situations that take them away. Our club continually strives to bring in new members to combat this natural turnover, to provide a stronger leadership base and to bring a flow of fresh, new ideas and personalities.

Vital aspects of a distinguished club are to grow membership (+5 members) or stay at charter strength (20+ members) each year by achieving goals #7 and #8 (adding +4 members each).

This is a key task of the Vice President of Membership (VPM). Even without a dedicated VPM club officer in 2020-2021, we still achieved these goals! So a big kudos to our club officers for taking charge. Our membership size history is in Figure 8.



Figure 8: APL membership size at charter strength (>=20) every year except 2020 with a high of 51 and low of 16.

The large membership size in 2008-2010 was when APL's training department paid the Toastmasters International fee, excluding the club fee, for all APL members. The size of club has decreased over time but has remained at charter strength for all but the last two years. In 2020-2021, we were only one member shy of being at charter strength again which is necessary to be a Distinguished Club.

This underscores the continuing need for members to invite guests to meetings, for public relations and other officers to communicate on-going club activities to APL and the larger community, and for all members to play active roles during events such as open houses, speech contests, regular meetings, workshops, and APL club special events.

The benefit in attracting new members is to keep the club vibrant and strong for YOU! Membership growth depends on new members, of course, as shown in Figure 9.




Figure 8: APL Club Membership Growth depends on recruiting new members each and every year. A club "refresh".

As our own history shows, attracting at least nine (9) new members per year while maintaining 20+ membership size is a strong indicator of club success as far as maintaining or becoming a Distinguished Club.

As seen in Figure 8, our best streak of club success began when 23 new members in 2008-2009 and 20 new members in 2009-2010 joined our club. However, this was back when the APL mentoring program and quite a number of APL managers "strongly advised" people to join and paid their fees. Today, even though APL managers might still recommend people join, members pay their own way in terms of Toastmaster International and club fees.


Over the last two years, even though new members were joining, membership size dipped below 20. Hence, this is in part why it was more difficult to earn the Distinguished status. This underscores the need for membership drives, open houses, external communication on club activities, and membership retention efforts.

## Congratulations! by Laura Dougan and Doug Kelly

Also, let's encourage each member to strive for their next educational award(s) this year, too. The number of members currently making progress along their chosen path is shown in Figure 9.



**Figure 9**: Number of members making progress along their path as of 30 July 2021. Innovative Planning is the most popular.

The three most popular paths are Innovative Planning (IP) with 6 members, Engaging Humor (EH) with 4 members and Presentation Mastery (PM) with 3 members. The middle packers are Team Collaboration (TC), Motivational Strategies (MS), and Dynamic Leadership (DL) each with 2 members. Lastly, we have one member pursuing Effective Coaching, Leadership Development, Visionary Communication or Pathways Mentor Program. Figure 10 reveals the path(s) each member has already picked.

Members highlighted in **BLUE** are committed to earning their next award before 31 December 2021. For example, Laura has 1 project to go to earn her Innovative Planning Level 5 (IP5) award in November and has already completed her Level 3 (IP3) & Level 4 (IP4) projects. Members highlighted in **GREEN** are committed to earning their next award before 30 June 2022. For instance, Emilee is 2 projects away from her Engaging Humor Level 1 (EH1) award in February.

For members who have yet to decide on a path, working toward their Presentation Mastery Level 1 (PM1) is a respectable default path to pursue. However, all Level 1 (L1) projects are identical for all paths; hence, any other path may be picked instead.

Hypothetically, this year, 16 members could earn a Level 1 (L1) award, 3 members earn a Level 2 (L2), 1 member earn a Level 4 (L3) award, and 2 members earn 3 higher level awards (L4 & L5). This would mean the club earns 4 out of 6 distinguished points. Hence, we would only need 2 members to earn 2 more awards (1 L2 award and 1 L3 award) to earn the remaining 2 distinguished points.

Of course, Toastmasters is a self-paced educational program and each member decides what awards to achieve; however, each award typically requires completing 3 projects which takes between 3 to 5 club meetings. Since we have 10 meetings from August to December, this means at least 20 speaking and evaluator slots. Assuming it takes 5 club meetings for a level 1 award, then, practically, at most 9 members could finish their award before 31 December 2021. However, the club could easily accommodate more speeches based upon the member's interests.

Anyway, your mentors, club officers, and especially the VPE are here to help you achieve your educational goals.
